A SCHOOLWIDE SERVICE PROJECT "IN THE BAG" TO FIGHT HUNGER



When Sarah Hartzell '25 joined the Youth Advisory Council, she quickly went to work with the organization's zero hunger/ zero waste initiative. With a \$250 grant from Kroger, Hartzell partnered with the Dayton Foodbank and Carroll Campus Ministry to kickstart her project to help the Foodbank's Good-to-Go backpacks project- a program that discreetly provides snack bags and informational resources to food-insecure students who are at risk for going hungry on days when school is not in session.

During Lent, each family room at Carroll donated snacks and even decorated bags for Sarah's Good-to-Go program. With the help of her peers, Sarah was able to donate 250 bags for the program and feed hundreds of Dayton students in need.

She is also proud to have volunteered with Carroll's monthly mobile food pantry project in its inaugural year on campus. "I think that it's really cool that it's been able to come to Carroll and that it's had success here," Comer said, "It's really cool to be a part of that."

CARROLL HOSTS FOOD PANTRY TO HELP SERVE NEIGHBORS IN NEED



Archbishop Carroll High School hosted With God's Grace mobile food pantry one evening each month as a new initiative to fight food insecurity in our community. On the fourth Monday of each month during the school year, a group of Carroll students, faculty, and parents operated the drive-thru food pantry to provide our neighbors in need with nourishing meals free of charge, serving approximately 90 families each session.



EARN A DOLLAR-FOR-DOLLAR TAX CREDIT ON OHIO INCOME TAXES WHEN YOU GIVE TO ARCHBISHOP CARROLL HIGH SCHOOL

The State of Ohio has passed a bill that allows a tax credit for qualified donations to a certified Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO). Ohio taxpayers who donate to SGOs may be able to claim a dollar-for-dollar, non-refundable tax credit on their Ohio income tax return for up to \$750 per donor or up to \$1,500 if married and filing jointly.

HOW CAN I GIVE TO CARROLL THROUGH THIS PROGRAM?

Make your gift through the Archdiocese of Cincinnati's Catholic Education Foundation (CEF), a certified SGO with the State of Ohio. Designate Archbishop Carroll High School as your school of choice to ensure that your entire gift is directed to our school. You can make your gift online or through sending a check attached to a mail-in form.

HOW DO I CLAIM THE CREDIT ON MY TAX RETURN?

Shortly after your gift has been received and processed, the CEF-SGO will mail a gift acknowledgement letter to you. This letter can serve as documentation for a non-refundable Ohio income tax credit (up to \$750 per donor across all SGO donations for the tax year) when you prepare your Ohio income tax return.

WHAT ELSE SHOULD I KNOW ABOUT THIS PROGRAM?

Everyone's tax situation is different, and we encourage you to check with your tax preparation professional to determine if this is the best way for you to make a gift and help offset your state and federal tax liabilities. Contact Archbishop Carroll High School Director of Advancement Pete Williams '98 if you have questions about how donating to Carroll through the CEF-SGO will affect your current annual giving.

FAITH FIRST

Three Carroll Faculty Members Recognized as Leaders in Catholic Education

Our mission at Carroll is to provide a welcoming Catholic community focused on the holistic formation of students. This mission would be impossible without the dedicated teachers who lead and support their students and colleagues along the way. This past school year, three teachers received various honors and accolades pertaining to their ability to serve as daily witnesses of the Catholic faith in their roles as teachers, club moderators, and mentors.

For Ms. Emily Sreenan, teaching religion has been something that she encounters both at home and in the classroom. As a recent graduate of the University of Dayton's Lalanne program, Ms. Sreenan has been living in community with fellow Catholic educators and mentors for the past two years while earning her masters degree and working at Archbishop Carroll High School. The program celebrated its 25th year in the UD Center for Catholic Education, and Ms. Sreenan was named this year's recipient of the Lalanne program's Dubrowski Fellowship.

The fellowship was awarded to Emily upon completion of the Lalanne program and is to be used for either continuing education or for classroom resources. With the fellowship award, Ms. Sreenan hopes to provide materials to help Carroll students encounter Christ more deeply, specifically by providing additional resources for her students to assist in deepening their prayer lives and their encounters with the lives of the Saints. She also hopes to use some of the fellowship for Carroll's liturgical choir, which she directs and leads her students and fellow staff for the allschool Masses throughout the year.

"Hopefully, as the school year goes on, I can continue to share my passion for my faith and bring my students and colleagues into personal encounters with Christ," Ms. Sreenan said.

Encountering students where they are and finding ways to include everyone has been a mission for Intervention Specialist Ben Swick. "Our whole goal is to get everybody included, and I think Carroll does a great job with that in general," said Swick, and he brings his passion for community and inclusivity in every role he plays at Carroll. Whether he is coaching students on the soccer field, working with them in an intervention setting, or assisting with the Student Community Engagement Committee tackle tricky subjects like racial injustice, Mr. Swick strives to create a united, team environment where everyone can thrive.

Swick, who works to advocate for and mentor often the most vulnerable population of students, received the Sr. Dorothy Stang Award from the Archdiocese of Cincinnati. This peernominated award is named after Sr. Dorothy Stang, who was murdered after spending nearly four decades of advocating for the poor and vulnerable all over the world. When Swick sees Catholic role models, like Stang or St. Teresa of Calcutta, "I see my mom (Karen) in them," he said, and she inspires him to care for the most vulnerable in the community as well. Said Swick, "I love carrying on their mission."

For Melissa (Balsom) Fisher '83, her lifelong mission has been to lead by example. With 36 years in Catholic schools, Fisher was named a finalist for the Lumen Fidei (Light of Faith) Catholic School Teacher of the Year award. "It is an honor," said Fisher, "I hope I can inspire people to live their vocation- to live a life that God is calling them to." Mrs. Fisher has done just that for countless Patriots and the Carroll community. Diving into service projects with staff and students, Melissa spends countless hours in service both in school and in the greater Dayton community with service projects, Mission Dayton, the newly-reintroduced Key Club, and the Crispaz mission trip to El Salvador, among many other projects. Though she has always been involved with service projects during her time as an educator, she officially has been Carroll's Service Coordinator since 2012, and she has assisted students make breakfast for soup kitchens prior to the start of the school day, has helped take students to tutor at elementary schools, and has kept track of all of the service hours students perform each year.

Fisher's coworkers nominated her for the Lumen Fidei award, which

recognizes teachers who are bringing Christ's light to their students and colleagues through outstanding Catholic teaching in the state of Ohio. In the classroom she provides handson, experiential learning activities in her religion courses so that students can deepen their faith and not lose it. "I can't imagine my life without Jesus," said Fisher, "and I hope I can bring Him to my students and my coworkers."

Though each educator is at a different point in their professional careers, they all have served as outstanding leaders in Catholic education, and each had nothing but gratitude to share. Each mentioned their incredible students and colleagues at Carroll. With the new restructuring of the Intervention Specialist program, Swick specifically

thanked his Intervention Specialist department, saying, "They're just a phenomenal team." Leading the team of teacher mentors, Melissa Fisher was teary-eyed when she heard of her award nomination. "I'm lucky to work in a place with so many wonderful people. There's such a great support system here."

Ms. Sreeenan's hope for next school year, like Swick's and Fisher's, was for her students and colleagues to know that, "...they are loved by Christ and that He is present with all of us." Said Sreenan, "I'm very grateful for the opportunities and look forward to continuing to be a part of the Patriot Family."

STUDENT REFLECTION | MEET MEGAN GANTER '24

When I began my freshman year at Carroll, I was remarkably nervous and quiet. I did not know more than five other freshmen in my class and was now attending a school much larger than my previous middle school. The pandemic, of course, had prevented my class from finishing out our eighth grade year as usual, and I felt unprepared to begin high school; most of my classmates almost certainly felt the same way. My middle school class was relatively small, and there were not many extracurricular activities to join, so I had never learned how to get out of my comfort zone – I never had to.

At Carroll, though, I was in a much larger class and had dozens of activities to choose from. At first, I was overwhelmed, and I did not begin to branch out until my sophomore year when I took Mrs. Hughes' Creative Writing class. I had always been nervous about sharing non-academic writing with others and was incredibly anxious about it at the beginning of the semester. Despite these anxieties, I quickly began to love the class. Mrs. Hughes encouraged us to be confident in our work and gave us so many opportunities to explore different ways to express ourselves and our ideas. While this was nowhere near my most difficult or most academically influential class, it did allow me for the first time since middle school to feel confident in my ability to write creatively and in my ability to be confident, in myself and in my work, which would last throughout my next two years at Carroll.

Students taking Carroll's Creative Writing class are required to contribute to Write-On, our school's literary publication. Of course, I helped to edit the publication during my sophomore year and submitted some of my own work as well. I was so excited to be a part of something bigger than myself and finally gained the courage to become more involved in Carroll's many clubs and organizations the following year. Write-On, like my Creative Writing class, quickly became one of the most influential aspects of the next two years. Mrs. Hughes allowed me to be the Editorin-Chief (alongside Nathan Snizik '23 my junior year), which gave me the opportunity to lead an organization for the first time. I was responsible for editing the works submitted and organizing them within the magazine, ensuring that everyone's work was properly represented each semester.

While Write-On is a great opportunity for students to share their work with others, it was an even better chance to gain valuable leadership skills and experience. I learned that, once one is in a position of leadership, collaboration and effective communication with others are both much more important than anything else; it is crucial that everyone feels that their voice is heard and that they can make a contribution to an organization as a whole. Participating in Write-On was a wonderful experience, and I hope to continue to use these skills throughout my next four years at college.

THE LEADER OF THE BAND

Sarah Nemeth '25 Continues Tradition of Leadership for the Marching Patriots

Sarah Nemeth '25 remembers the uneasy feeling of walking into her first marching band practice before the start of her freshman year. Coming to Archbishop Carroll High School from a middle school with just two other classmates was intimidating, but she knew she made the right decision immediately.

"All the seniors and leadership were at the door with really big smiles to welcome me to the program," Nemeth said. "I loved how welcoming and inclusive they were. That was a really big fear of mine coming into the school – not being included or knowing anybody. They made it so easy. I wanted to stay as part of that community because of the seniors."

Now, Nemeth has her opportunity to make an impact on the next group of



nervous freshmen in the marching band and throughout the school. As the Drum Major for the Marching Patriots, Nemeth embraces multiple leadership roles for the program. Everyone who watches the group perform instantly spots her as she leads the band and guard on field as the conductor from her prominent spot on an elevated platform, but her responsibilities out of the spotlight are just as crucial to the band's success.

"You're there to uplift your band and represent them at performances. You're the face of the band and put forth what your band is."

Showing up on time, staying organized, and having a positive attitude throughout the duration of the season are some of the baseline expectations for every member of the program. Learning the basics of how to march and play under the hot July sun and refining every detail of the show with precision during November's cold are taxing endeavors.

Nemeth and the rest of the student leadership team create an environment and culture that enables the group to



stay focused through difficult times and win big on the field. The Marching Patriots finish near the top of their division in their performance circuit annually. During the 2023 season, the group won a regional championship in the most prestigious national circuit, Bands of America, for their competition show, Open Mic.

Leading a group of dozens of performers is a task that requires more than one student to step up, and the faculty directors of the program ensure that all the responsibility does not fall on just one person. Carl Soucek has been the Director of Bands since 2002 and has





made student leadership a foundational pillar of the program.

"The value of our leadership structure is equal to, if not greater than, the music pedagogy itself," Soucek said. "By establishing a leadership team, students are empowered to help others in a variety of ways. The leadership team is heavily involved in the instruction of fundamental music and marching skills, character development with a strong focus on integrity, and social justice. They also plan activities for team building and faith formation." "They push us to be our very best selves, and that's why we've done so great the previous years," Nemeth said. "Their support, expectations, encouragement, and kindness make for a very good environment."

The impact that Soucek, Assistant Director Brooke Butler '17, and Guard Directors Lindsey Rhule '20 and Taylor Fenten '20 make on the students inspires them to give their best effort in every rehearsal and performance of the show.

Students Learn to Lead Their Peers Through the House System

If one would have stepped into Mr. Ramsey's classroom during his Charity House Family Room time this past school year, one would see Alyssa Applin '24 and her co-captain Kaelen Bauersfeld '24 working together to lead their family room through many different academic, service-oriented, and bonding activities. Alyssa started in Mr. Ramsey's family room as a freshman and has spent her four years there growing closer to her peers and witnessing the previous Charity house captains pave the way for her to step into the house captain role.

For Applin, she felt as if being a house captain had been something that seemed almost inevitable. Mr. Ramsey had mentioned to her that she would make a great house captain one day, and the idea did not leave Applin. Having had very organized, hard-working captains lead her family room, even with all of the challenges brought on by remote learning during the pandemic, Alyssa felt called to lead her peers as well. Last year's captain, Cameron Chambers '23, sent out weekly schedules and kept things engaging and organized. "She made it look fun even though I knew it was going to be a lot of work," recalled Applin. All of her Family Room captains left what Applin described as "big shoes to fill."

Alyssa recalls feeling very comfortable with her house captains and that if she had any questions or concerns about school, she could come to them for help and guidance, and she worked to create that same environment for the underclassmen in her family room. By working on academic days, keeping herself organized, and being present and engaged in the activities going on each day in the family room, she strived to lead by example.

While she was working on being a positive example for her peers, she was receiving guidance from Mr. Ramsey. The best advice she received from him, Applin recalled, was that he told her to stay organized and to lead with confidence. That was the key to a lot of her successes last year. "When I showed that I was confident, even if I didn't feel it, my family room was more likely to listen to me," Applin said.

Now that her time as a house captain has come to a close, Alyssa shared the takeaways of her time leading her classmates. "I hope they think that I was a good captain and that they'll reach out to me after high school," Applin said. She felt that her experiences as a Charity House captain gave her the opportunity to learn how to successfully complete tasks and activities collaboratively through organized, clear communication.She is looking forward to applying these skills into her future career as a researcher.


This isn't a scenario in a video game but rather one part of an exclusive contest for the brightest high school students across the United States

to put their knowledge of STEM Education principles to the test. 2024 marked the third year in a row and fifth time that a group of Archbishop Carroll High School students earned the distinction of Best in Ohio and an invitation to compete in the Technology Students Association TEAMS (Tests of Engineering Aptitude, Math, and Science) at TSA's national conference. The Carroll groups finished in the top ten nationally in three of the six events they competed in, including a third place finish for Arnold, Kyle Heilmann, '24, David McLoughlin '24, and Neil Tivakaran '24 in the Design/Build event.

"The classes I took at Carroll prepared me super well," Arnold said. "I felt like I had read about the concepts before. I also learned so much about taking tests and how to apply what I've learned in the classroom to situations like that." Science Department Co-chair Mrs. Laurie Fuhr and Mathematics Department Chair Mrs. Mary Ollier coach the TEAMS competition groups. While it's impossible for any high school student to have comprehensive knowledge of every STEM topic as a teenager, they help lead a group of educators who ensure that STEM education is accessible to every Carroll Patriot. Students of all

abilities have the opportunity to learn foundational skills and knowledge in 53 courses, including six at the Advanced Placement level. The courses and instruction across Carroll's STEM curriculum are designed to do more than just prepare students for college and lucrative careers after high school – they prepare the next generation of problem solvers and job creators.

"The STEM classes were always my favorite," Arnold said. "Math and computer science were the highlights every year for me. My teachers and the content fostered my love for engineering and drove me to do more research on my own."

Learning concepts in a classroom is just one component of STEM Education at Carroll. Dozens of Patriots have gained practical and professional experience for their futures as paid interns in the Wright Scholars

program at Wright Patterson Air Force Base during the summers, and all students taking honors science perform research projects to present at Carroll's annual Science Day in February.

Carroll students consistently place among the highest achievers at county, district, and state science days. Since 2005, 21 Patriots have been invited to present their independent research at the International Science and Engineering Fair, the most prestigious competition for high school STEM students on the planet. Students' performance at State Science Day have earned the Shaw Award, the highest honor granted by the Ohio Academy of Science, four times for Carroll.

"It's one of the prime examples of how we learn at Carroll to apply what we learn in the classroom to real life situations," Arnold said. "You have to be independent, but I was impressed with how supportive the teachers are throughout my projects. They would always read over my papers, check my project, and often grant insightful ideas that would add a lot of detail and relevance to my project. It helped me grow in my love of engineering."

Learning. Doing. Giving.

Those three words have stuck with Beth Savage throughout her career, and they serve as her roadmap of leadership for life. Savage's journey in leadership has landed her in boardrooms of corporations and communities, but her philosophy has helped both thrive.

DOING THE WORK

Earning an official leadership title in any setting is the beginning of the journey, not the peak, according to Savage. She became the president and CEO of PQ Systems, a company that designs manufacturing software solutions, after serving as its Marketing Director for ten years. After transforming the company's marketing

strategy, Savage sought to transform the organization's culture for continued growth.

Replacing large, yearly employee surveys with more personable weekly check-ins and keeping up with the mindset of her team enabled Savage to receive constant feedback about their insights and concerns.

"Once you get to a position of leadership, it doesn't mean that you know everything. It just means you have a lot more to learn from your team. Being curious and always asking questions and continuing to learn is super important."

Savage credits this approach to employment engagement as a key factor in PQ's growth. The challenge of balancing the customers' need for low prices with her teams' need for high salaries while competing with other groups in the market was always at or near the top of Savage's lists of critical tasks as the head of the company.

"My focus as the leader of the organization was keeping the employees happy and helping them be the best version of themselves," Savage said. "I didn't have to worry about the customers, because the employees would take care of the customers."

GIVING BACK

When the time came to retire and transfer leadership of PQ Systems in 2023, Savage made the difficult decision to sell the company after evaluating a wide array of options. More than a year later, Savage is pleased to see many of her former employees thriving and advancing their careers with PQ's new leadership team or other organizations. Even in retirement, Savage continues to lead.

Savage shares her time and knowledge with today's business owners through the Small Business Administration's SCORE Program. SCORE's mission



is to foster vibrant small business communities through mentoring and educational workshops. Its mentors offer area-specific advice at no cost to small businesses on topics like finance, human resources, and business planning.

"I had a ton of mentors. When you're the top dog of an organization it can be a little bit lonely. You don't have peers in your department to bounce ideas off of. I reached out to any resources that I could. There were many, many other mentors that I had through the years who were very giving of their time. Now I'm at the point where I want to give."

The business leaders Savage mentors through SCORE are some of the brightest minds in a diverse field of industries like artificial intelligence, hair care, and behavioral science. She says helping her mentees realize they already know what's best for their business is how she makes the biggest impact.

"What I try to do is ask questions because they know the answer already, but they want the confidence that it's the right answer. Sometimes the next steps [to grow a business] are hard. It might be hard to go get that business loan or say no to a customer who isn't a good match for you."

Providing guidance to private sector businesses is not the only way Savage gives back. She currently serves as a board member of the W. Edward Deming Institute, a North Carolina based organization that trains business leaders, and Wright State University's Raj Soin College of Business. Additionally, she served on the board of Catholic Social Services of the Miami Valley for six years and is a regular volunteer at Carroll's St. Pat's Fest and the St. Helen Parish Summer Festival.

LEARNING TO LEAD

Marching as part of the Color Guard during her time as a Carroll student is one of Savage's earliest memories of seeing how leadership and teamwork are crucial to achieving the highest levels of success.

"We won competitions and got to perform in the Orange Bowl, and that was an amazing experience," Savage said. "[The directors] emphasized that you're only as strong as your weakest member, and we have to work as a team. We had a lot of members, and getting that many people to be in unison was not easy. It was a foundation for me in learning about teams and working together."

Away from the competition field, Savage also recognizes the difference Catholic education at Carroll made in her life.

"Carroll is super important to me because that was the foundation of my education. When I went onto college and onto work, I felt very well prepared, much more so than some of my fellow students or colleagues who didn't have the privilege of a Carroll education."




